Town among top 10 to call home

■ Borough beats London in national survey of wages

WARRINGTON has been named in the top 10 places in the country to make a living.

Research from credit comparison website *TotallyMoney.com* revealed that the Cheshire town was one of the best places to call home when comparing average wages to mortgage repayments.

Warrington was placed in seventh position with the average monthly salary in Warrington listed at £1,799 and average monthly mortgage repayments standing at £721.

Blackburn came out on top followed by Derby, Cambridge, Sunderland, Milton Keynes and Coventry.

Council leader Cllr Terry O'Neill described it as 'more good news for the town'.

He said: "It's great to appear in the list but it really doesn't come as a surprise.

"Warrington is nationally recognised as an economic powerhouse as all of the independently

produced stats verify.

"Warrington is ranked third in the UK for highest business growth, only bettered by London and Aberdeen.

"Our SMEs fare even better. They are ranked number one in the UK for high growth.

"Add to that, we also have one of the highest rates of business start-ups in the UK."

The analysis compared median wages to mortgage repayments, cost of living and the health of the job markets in each town.

The calculations focused on working and living in each town with no points awarded for scen-

ery, culture or connections to the rest of the UK.

London was ranked at number 26, proving that while salaries in the capital are higher than elsewhere, they are not high enough to compensate for the cost of living.

Burnley, Newport, Blackpool, Rochdale and Gloucester were listed in the worst five places to make a living.

Future plans for the town are expected to see the town continue to grow, added Cllr O'Neill.

He said: "What is important and is a priority in terms of Warrington Borough Council's agenda, is that we maintain that position and encourage it to grow.

"We need to make sure that there are a steady flow of jobs for people in the future which is why our ambitious growth framework Warrington Means Business is so important.

"We've announced projects with a value of £750million so far and there are more to come."

Projects including the Future Tech Studio School, University Technical College Warrington and the £8.5m business incubator in the Stadium Quarter are part of the council's strategy to open doors to new business opportunities and training.

Within the hour, thieves were able to make a number of withdrawals and transactions.

While the stolen cash has been returned to the victim, she now hopes the police will be able to find those involved and bring them to justice.

PC Graham Davies has issued a warning to shoppers to always be vigilant.

He said: "If you have to carry your purse in your bag, always keep it zipped shut.

"My experience of these offences is that the offenders are often very skilled but will always take the easy option when looking for a victim - an open bag is just the option they like.

"Always be wary of people invading your personal space when you are out and about.

"Displays and tills are areas where these offences tend to take place as they know people's attention will be elsewhere."

Police have released a CCTV image of four people they would like to speak to in relation to the incident.

Hacker fights fare

AN anonymous 'hactivist' says he will make Network Warrington's website unavailable in 'retaliation' to increased bus fares.

The hacker, known only as Grey, said he will execute a Distributed Denial of Service (DDoS) attack on networkwarrington.com until a statement is made on why fares have increased.

The *Warrington Guardian* has repeatedly asked for the firm to explain its price hike of up to 65 per cent on some tickets.

It is now the fourth week attempts have been made but officials have not responded despite increasing anger and frustration from passengers.
